Topic: Pirates & Princesses

Overview: This half term our topic is 'Pirates & Princesses'.

There is no set text to learn we just read lots of pirate stories and discuss them - Who is in the story? what happened? What was your favourite bit?

Please find below a selection of activities that you can choose to work through with your child, remember in Year R we learn best by doing things in active and practical ways and approaching things 'little and often'. In Year R we have plenty of time throughout the day for Child Initiated Learning, where children choose what they are doing and how. We support this learning by chatting with the children and asking about their tasks, we encourage them to go further and ask questions to help them to get there.

- Please keep practising forming letters correctly, reading and writing phonics sounds, reading and writing High Frequency words.
- Please continue to practise number recognition and accurate counting, saying one more and one less than a given number and adding and subtracting 2 numbers.
- Don't forget to share your child's endeavours on Tapestry, we would love to see what they have been keeping busy doing whether it is from our list of ideas or your own home learning.
